There are two more Conversations to go. Don't miss these:

Tuesday, March 12: **Why We Look The Way We Do**. A discussion of architectural styles that characterize Sarasota. Moderator, Harold Bubil, Real Estate Editor of the Sarasota Herald-Tribune.

Tuesday, April 9: **A City of the Performing Arts.** Moderator, Howard Millman. A discussion of how Sarasota evolved into a cultural destination and became famous for its performing arts.



In December, Deborah Walk and Ron McCarty from the Ringling Museum presented a lively lecture (with photos) about how the Ringling brothers and their families guided the development of Sarasota starting in 1912. The Ringling influence continues today.



The topic of Newtown Before and After Integration was tackled by Dr. Ed James, County Commissioner Carolyn Mason, former Mayor of Sarasota Lou Ann Palmer and educator Dorothye Smith. All of these people were personally impacted either as teachers or students when high schools were integrated in Sarasota in 1968.

What's Going On

It was a struggle initially, but Gift Shop Manager Jane Kirschner-Tuccillo reports that the HSOSC Gift Shop is finally becoming recognized in the community as a destination for discovering artisan-created objects that are locally made. "This year we have about 35 craftspeople, artists and authors who consign with us," said Jane. "Besides books by local authors we stock jewelry, bird houses, garden art, woven rugs, post cards and note cards, pottery, tote bags for spring and summer, table linens and lots more. What's so great is that word has gotten around and community people looking for an unusual gift or home decor item are finding us. This means a higher profile for the Historical Society and revenue for us that goes into maintaining the Crocker Memorial Church and the Bidwell-Wood House as well as producing special community events." The Gift Shop is located in the detached kitchen of the Bidwell-Wood House. Credit cards welcome. "We need volunteers to staff the shop," added Jane. Good-looking beach or shopping totes are available at the HSOSC Gift Shop. Besides regular hours of 10-2 weekdays, the shop is open an hour before all events on the property and before each monthly meeting.

For more than a decade well known author, historian, actress and preservation activist Sue Blue has organized and conducted enormously popular trolley tours of historically important destinations in the Sarasota area. Recently the Ordinary Historians of HSOSC produced a video interview with Sue that is available for viewing at HSOSC. It is also in the permanent collection of videos that comprise the oral history archives at the History Center. Sue lives in a 1925 Florida cottage that was built by her grandfather and her memories about growing up here deserve a wide audience. She's quite a community resource.



Events, Gatherings, Enrichment and Fun at HSOSC



Humor writer and self-confessed real estate junkie Bob Plunket moderated a panel discussion on the history, present and future of real estate in Sarasota County. Joining him were author/historian Jeff LaHurd and Realtors Lynn Robbins and David Jennings.



Site Manager Linda Garcia reports that in 2012 the Crocker Memorial Church was the location for seven weddings. This year we have booked six so far. "The building can hold about 100 and since the church was de-commissioned in 2006, we do both religious and secular ceremonies," said Linda. "Wedding rentals are \$100 an hour with a three hour minimum and the wedding party has the use of the gardens and the Bidwell-Wood House, which is where the wedding party often changes clothes." Linda also notes that photo opportunities at the two historic building are a big draw. Revenue from wedding rentals helps to maintain both buildings and to fund community enrichment projects. Besides being used for weddings, community groups such as the James Joyce Society, Great Books Club, and the Earlye Musike Consort regularly use the Crocker Memorial Church for meetings and events. Because of the commitment of the HSOSC Board to adaptive use of our historic buildings, the community has begun to take ownership of these vital historic properties. Funds generated by events, membership dues and contributions help preserve these buildings for future generations. Docent-led tours of the buildings support the HSOSC mission to spread awareness of Florida history. Please let your friends know about the availability of the Crocker Memorial Church for a memorable wedding or meeting space. The pews can be moved to set up tables and chairs and we have a sound system.
